## DEMOLITION

### **When will you be demolishing the old Hazelwood Power Station?**

The commencement date of the site demolition is yet to be determined. Our current target is to start demolition in April 2019 however that date is subject to contract negotiation, along with a number of internal and external approvals.

### **Are there any other buildings or equipment on the Hazelwood site that will be demolished, other than the Station?**

Yes, the demolition scope also includes Mine infrastructure such as dredgers and conveyor systems as well as a number of workshops, offices and other infrastructure on site.

### **Who will carry out the work?**

ENGIE Hazelwood is in the process of tendering the site demolition works. Three tenderers are involved in this process which will conclude early next year. Once finalised, and the successful tender awarded, we will announce who will be carrying out the work.

### **Are you using any local labour on the project?**

Yes, local labour will be used in the demolition work. ENGIE Hazelwood has included explicit clauses in the tender documents that require the contractors to consider local labour wherever possible.

### **How do we know demolition will be done safely?**

A safety management plan for the demolition will be developed in collaboration between ENGIE Hazelwood and the demolition contractor. The demolition contractor is required to perform all demolition works in accordance with the legislative framework for the industry as well as the Occupational Health and Safety Act. WorkSafe representatives will be involved during the planning and execution phase of the demolition project.

### **How long will it take to completely demolish the Station and associated infrastructure?**

We have allowed three years however we will not know exactly how long the demolition works will take until we have consulted more thoroughly with the demolition contractor during the tendering phase.





**What part of the Station will you demolish first?**

That depends largely on the demolition contractor’s preferred methodology for the work. Our current assumptions are that the asbestos removal works will be carried out very early in the project, prior to more comprehensive demolition works taking place. Our preference is to demolish the chimneys as early as possible, given their poor state.

**Will the chimneys be demolished using explosives?**

The methodology for the chimney demolition is yet to be finalised. There are a number of factors, including asbestos

removal, that need to be considered and evaluated prior to determining whether explosives will be used or not. Again, more details will be understood once the demolition contract has been finalised.

**What happens to all the material waste from the buildings following demolition?**

The majority of scrap materials (more than 95 per cent) generated during the demolition, such as steel, copper and concrete, will be recycled. A small amount of general waste will be generated and disposed of using normal facilities.
